Executive Director's Message

Dear Friends,

I'm not sure I can tell the story of 2024 in a way that's going to be especially exciting. There weren't any large dramatic seizures or heroic rescue efforts I can wow you with, no new awards or accolaids to report. We spent 2024 doing what we do best: helping horses find new and better lives.

What you have to understand is that helping horses find new and better lives is a massive undertaking in itself, at least the way we do it. It starts with bringing a horse home and getting to know them as best we can. Rehabiliation, whether physical, mental, or both, is a process that can't be put on a timeline, and getting a neglected horse back to good health and proper weight can be a challenge. Then comes education. Nearly every horse we rescue needs some amount of reschooling, and many come to us to learn everything from wearing a halter to carrying a rider. This stage of the process takes as long as it takes, and we won't offer a horse for adoption until we feel the horse is ready. Then it's time to choose an adopter. We weed through applications, set up showings, check references, conduct site visits...all the steps that need to happen to find the best home for that particular horse.

So if 2024 wasn't our most exciting year, it did give us something just as important: steady days, healthy horses, full bellies, and a team of people showing up — every single day — to do the work that matters.

We don't need a crisis to remind us how much this work matters. Every halter buckled, every hoof trimmed, every warm mash served on a cold morning — these are the quiet acts of love that define rescue. And they only happen because of you.

Your support, your time, your belief in these horses — it's what makes all of this possible. In a year that may look "ordinary" from the outside, we know the truth: this work is extraordinary, because the lives it touches are.

From all of us — two-legged and four — thank you for standing with us, for trusting us, and for helping us keep our promise: that once a horse finds us, they are never forgotten.

Our donors outdid themselves once again in 2024 with another terrific year of support for the horses. Revenue was at an all-time high, even with fewer individual donors than the year before. Interestingly, 78% of the donation revenue we earned came from retained donors, with only 19% from first-time donors and 3% from recaptured donors. In total, we had 897 individuals and companies making gifts in 2024


A Good Horse is Never a Bad Color

The origins of this proverb are unknown, but the sentiment is clear: a horse's abilities and temperament are more valuable than its coat color. But every so often, you meet a horse like Theo, who checks all the boxes. Theo is quite literally a golden child. He arrived at SAFE in January 2024, and as he regained his health and put on weight, he quickly transformed from a scruffy two-year-old into a richly radiant palomino with a flowing white mane, a wide blaze, and four high stockings. Like the reincarnation of Roy Roger's Trigger Jr., Theo is simply one of the most stunning horses you might ever meet. But he's more than just a pretty face. Theo has a personality that can't be beat. He's just a very, very nice horse. He's kind, understanding, and thoughtful. He loves nothing more than to romp and play with his friends, just as long as they get enough nap breaks for snoozing in the sun. Theo thinks people are great too, and he's always happy to amble over and say hello. He has an untroubled mind and a natural aptitude for work, which makes him a pleasure to work with. He took very quickly to ground work and being saddled, and we've been able to give him a solid foundation in his education as a riding horse, which is a responsibility we take very seriously. When Theo's adopter finds us, they'll appreciate him for all his positive qualities. His looks are just a cherry on top.




Intakes and Adoptions

Over the course of the year, SAFE took in 16 horses, including two that were returned from a previous adopter. We were able to place 15 horses by the end of the year. We said goodbye to seven horses in 2025: three with physical issues caused by neglect, three whose quality of life had declined to an untenable level, and one in a freak accident during his first saddling.




Intake and Adoption Statistics 2019–2024

This graph illustrates the sources of new horse intakes over the last six years. Animal Control (AC) cases take top priority but most years have about the same number of Owner Surrenders (OS).



The number of horses placed into adoptive homes in the same period tends to fluctuate, based on how many of our horses are actually ready for adoption. From 2019 to 2023 we saw the duration of horses' stays at SAFE decrease, but that figure was skewed in 2024 when we found a home for Lacey after nearly 9 years at SAFE.





Volunteers: the Heart of SAFE

With only five full-time paid employees on staff, the vast majority of SAFE's work is performed by volunteers. At our Redmond, WA facility, we have three regular chore shifts each day. Morning shifts are responsible for feeding, turnout, and stall cleaning. Afternoon shifts bring horses in for the night and clean their paddocks. "Night Check" serves one last late feeding and ensures that all the horses are tucked away safe and sound for the evening. There are also many other volunteers that keep SAFE operating at full capacity: our volunteer Board of Directors, the volunteers that make up the Operations Council, and the many individuals who work behind the scenes on facility maintenance, special events, fundraising, marketing, and more. Our volunteer program is critical to our success as a rescue, and it's absolutely true when we say we could not do what we do without our volunteers.

Extending Community Outreach

Because SAFE operates with a self-imposed cap of no more than 30 horses at any given time, there is a limit to how many horses we are able to help. Our Community Outreach Program was developed to help horse owners keep their horses out of the rescue pipeline. SAFE offers short-term assistance to horse owners facing life changes and challenges, as well as gelding surgery and humane euthanization. We also encourage owner responsibility by providing counseling and advice about safe rehoming and manageable horsekeeping practices.

In 2024, SAFE was contacted by 177 horse owners seeking help

Most of these horse owners were offered counseling, with an emphasis on safe rehoming and owner responsibility



owner-surrendered horses were taken in and SAFE spent \$5,285 to stabilize and rehabilitate them in their initial year at the rescue

SAFE provided hay to 42 horses across Washington State at a cost of \$3,881

SAFE spent an additional \$27,885 on Community Outreach Assistance:

20 humane euthanizations

11 horses received vet, farrier, or training

11 stallions turned into happy geldings



Financial stability has been a hallmark of SAFE for quite some time, and that trend continued in 2024. We recorded nearly \$1.4 million dollars in annual revenue but the success of 2024's Heart of the Horse event made our revenue stream skew toward special events. We ended the year with a significant revenue surplus, increasing our emergency reserves and improving the likelihood of property ownership in the future.

Accomplishments & Highlights

Safe at Home

Start a horse rescue...and it won't be long before you realize that there are far more horses in need than you can take in. There is a point at which rescuing more horses than you can realistically care for actually becomes the opposite of rescue. So, set a reasonable cap in the number of horses you can accommodate--ideally by looking at the amount of space, manpower, and resources you have available -- and stick to that number. This will give you a much better chance at building a sustainable and effective rescue organization.

The challenge to this approach is dealing with the number of phone calls and emails that you'll receive from perfectly upstanding citizens who are struggling to care for their own horses. It turns out that the hardest part of running a horse rescue is saying no to nice people who ask for help. Here at SAFE, we typically receive about 250-300 calls and emails each year from people who are worried about their horses. Some are in desperate situations and can't find their way out. Others just need advice, or maybe a bit of financial assistance to get back on track.

Since the very beginning, SAFE's Community Outreach Program has helped hundreds of horses and their owners. This safety net program was created to provide short-term assistance to horse owners struggling to care for their animals, with the ultimate goal of keeping these horses out of the rescue pipeline. Over the years, we've paid for hay & grain, veterinary care, gelding surgeries, humane euthanasia, training, and more. We've also taken in nearly 200 owner surrendered horses who needed more than just temporary assistance, and assumed full responsibility for these equines.

As you can imagine, a program like this is an enormous undertaking. The demand for assistance gets overwhelming at times, but that's nothing compared to the emotional toll that comes along with it. Compassion fatigue is real, and we

are vulnerable to it, especially when faced with situations we can't fix. Sometimes we feel like we're the last and only hope for these horses. There are times that we've felt less like horse rescuers and more like social workers. when pulled into situations involving elderly horse owners, family disputes, domestic violence, and divorce. We've had to convince people that they're not fit for horse ownership anymore. We've been expected to solve problems that go far beyond the scope of what we're offering. And we've had to say no to people, and bear the brunt of their disappointment, and sometimes their anger.

The budget for Community Outreach at SAFE has grown from less than \$2,000 per year in 2006 to \$40,000 per year in 2024. And still there's never enough money to fulfill all the demand. We've started partnering with organizations like the Marion & Richard Graham Foundation and the Tulalip Tribes Charitable Fund to increase the amount of money available for outreach cases, and we will continue to pursue grants to assist in this area.

In 2024, we decided to streamline the program and add clarity to what we are able to do. This has led to the rebranding of Community Outreach to a program we call "Safe at Home."

The premise of Safe at Home Community Assistance is simple: we want to keep horses out of the rescue pipeline by keeping them safe in their homes. To this end, we are partnering with horse owners in our community who are in need of short term assistance. We've allocated our Outreach budget to a voucher program divided between gelding, vet care, humane euthanasia, and a hay bank.

Safe at Home is meant to help responsible horse owners who just need a helping hand due to temporary personal or financial set backs. Sometimes that's all that's needed to keep a horse in the safest place of all: at HOME.

Acknowledgements

SAFE is all about the horses, but helping them would not be possible without people who chose to make our mission their own.
